THE ANATOMY OF HATE: SAVING OUR CHILDREN

Elie Wiesel and Governor Mario M. Cuomo are cosponsoring a conference, *The Anatomy of Hate: Saving Our Children*. Under the auspices of The Elie Wiesel Foundation for Humanity, the conference is being held at New York University School of Law, an institution with a history of teaching public service and tolerance through law.

This is the latest conference in a series on *The Anatomy of Hate* sponsored by the Foundation since its establishment in 1986 by Elie Wiesel after he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Conferences have been held in Boston, Haifa, Oslo, Paris and Moscow.

The conference brings together, by invitation only, a group of distinguished men and women with varied backgrounds and experience. Participants will discuss the impact of hate on our children and how they can best be helped to overcome it. They will examine how children learn hatred from their community, religious leaders, schoolmates, from books, films, radio, television and newspapers.

The conference is organized into plenary sessions and five seminar workshops which will discuss specific topics: Media and Education; Health, Family and Poverty; Religion, Morality and Violence; Ethnicity and Xenophobia; and The Trauma of Memory.


The goals are simple. Everyone knows there is a crisis of hate. We ask the participants to propose practical solutions for inoculating our children against hate and its effects, and for teaching them tolerance.

The culminating event is a Gala Concert at the Tisch Center for the Arts at the 92nd Street Y. Actor and writer Michael Moriarty will be the evening's host. Pianists Emanuel Ax and Yefim Bronfman and violinist Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg will perform, along with other artists.

Like cancer, if unchecked, it will spread and destroy the body which nurtures and carries it. Ultimately it is both destructive and self-destructive.

Hate inevitably leads to self-hate.

TERRY ANDERSON Former chief Middle East correspondent of the Associated Press, during which time he was held hostage in Lebanon from March 1985 to December 1991. Served in several positions at Associated Press since 1975, including Foreign Desk Editor in New York, news reporter in Tokyo, news editor in Johannesburg and Beirut news editor.

WALTER ANDERSON Editor, *Parade Magazine*, Senior Vice President, Parade Publications, Inc. Former investigative reporter. Former chairman and current trustee emeritus of the board of trustees of Mercy College; director of the National Dropout Prevention Fund. Recipient of several honorary doctorates and numerous state and national journalism awards for editorial excellence, including the Frank Tripp Memorial Award from Gannett. Author of "Read With Me" and other books.

MARTIN S. BEGUN Associate Dean and Vice President for External Affairs of the New York University School of Medicine and Medical Center. Also serves as Chairman of the Community Services Board of the New York City Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Alcoholism Services, and on the boards of the Executive Committee of the Associated Medical Schools of New York, Tel Aviv University and the Battery Park City Authority. A long-time advocate for compassionate care for the homeless, mentally ill; serves as an advisor to several prominent public figures on the subjects of health care and homelessness.

JO BENKOW President of the Norwegian Parliament (Stortinget). Former delegate to the United Nations General Assembly. Since 1973, member of the Nordic Council; former Chairman of the Norwegian delegation and former President of the Nordic Council. Former Chairman of the Conservative Party and Leader of the Parliamentary Group. Author of several volumes of political speeches and memoirs, including "From the Synagogue to the Norwegian Parliament," "Haakon, Maud and Olav," and "Olav — Man and Monarch."

STEWART BIALER Teacher at West Side Alternative High School, and Founder and Executive Director of TL Youthworks, an organization which provides a 10-week program for inner-city youth of study, communal living and work on a kibbutz in Israel.

THOMAS BISHOP Chair of the Center for French Civilization and Culture and Florence Gould Professor of French Literature at New York University. Recipient of numerous awards, including Chevalier Légion d'Honneur, Commandeur Ordre Nationale du Mérite, Officier Ordre des Arts et Lettres. Author of numerous published articles about Samuel Beckett; books include "Pirandello and the French Theater."

ERIC BREINDEL Editorial Page Editor of *The New York Post* and a syndicated columnist. Graduate of Harvard College, studied politics at the London School of Economics, and received a J.D. from Harvard Law School in 1982. Served as Senator Daniel Moynihan's Legislative Assistant for Foreign Policy and Intelligence before his appointment as Editorial Page Editor of *The Post*.

ROGER BROOKS Professor and first incumbent of the Elie Wiesel Chair in Judaic Studies at Connecticut College. Author of four books, numerous articles and editor of two volumes on Jewish-Christian relations. Serves as organizing chair of the Society of Biblical Literature's section on Early Rabbinic Judaism.

ROBERT CHAZAN Scheuer Professor of Hebrew and Judaic Studies and chairman of the Skirball Department of Hebrew and Judaic Studies at New York University. He has written extensively on the conflict between Christianity and Judaism during the Middle Ages, including "European Jewry and the First Crusade" and "Daggers of Faith."

BERNADETTE COOMARASWAMY Attorney Trial Referee for the State of Connecticut; co-coordinator for the Child Protection Team of Greenwich since 1979. Taught at Boston University and Westchester Community College; served on the board of directors of several community organizations, including the Child Guidance Clinic of Greater Stamford, Youth Shelter of Greenwich, the Regional Advisory Committee of Connecticut's Department of Children and Youth Services and United Way.

MARIO M. CUOMO Governor, State of New York. Elected to third term in 1990. First elected governor in 1982. Elected Lieutenant Governor in 1978 and appointed as New York Secretary of State in 1975.

REBECCA DOGGETT Director, The Office of Business and Job Opportunity, The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. Founding President of the Newark Free School Council, one of the first community-controlled Headstart Programs. Active in many civic organizations.

ARIEL DORFMAN Chilean author of plays, novels, poems, essays and articles; human rights activist. Many published works include the novels "Widows" and "The Last Song of Manuel Sendero," and a collection of essays, "The Empire's Old Clothes." Recipient of numerous honorary degrees and the Laurence Olivier Award for Best Play for "Death and the Maiden." Currently Research Professor of Literature and Latin American Studies at Duke University.

SAMUEL DRESNER Rabbi and Visiting Professor of Philosophy at The Jewish Theological Seminary. Working on a major biography of Abraham Joshua Heschel. Author of many books, including "The Zaddik," "The Sabbath," "The Jewish Dietary Laws," and the forthcoming book "Rachael."

ROBIN CHANDLER DUKE National Chairman of the Population Crisis Committee. Has worked extensively in countries around the world supporting health care for women and children. In the United States, as President Emeritus of NARAL, she has worked for a woman's right to reproductive freedom. Serves as a consultant to the United Nations Fund for Population Activities and on various Boards of Directors; Vice Chairman of the Institute of Internal Education. Recipient of numerous awards for work in humanitarian affairs.

STEPHEN ELLENWOOD Professor of Education and Chairman of the Curriculum and Teaching Department of the School of Education, Boston University. Chairman of Advisory Committee on Education, U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council, 1985-87. Author of articles on teaching curricula and consultant to numerous educational agencies and publications.

JAMES A. FORBES, JR. Senior Minister of The Riverside Church. Former Joe R. Engle Professor of Preaching at Union Theological Seminary; taught at Auburn Theological Seminary in New York City. Former Director of Education at Inter-Met Seminary in Washington, D.C. Recipient of numerous honorary degrees. As a leader of social action programs in the ecumenical community, participated in protests against apartheid in both Washington and New York.

MATT FOREMAN Executive Director, Gay and Lesbian Anti-Violence Project, a crime victim assistance agency. Previously worked in prison adminstration for 10 years, including service as Assistant Commissioner for the West Virginia Department of Corrections and director of New York City's work release program. Member, the Mayor's Police Council on Lesbian and Gay Issues, and the Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Intergroup Relations.

MONROE FREEDMAN Lichtenstein Distinguished Professor of Legal Ethics at Hofstra University. Dean of the Law School at Hofstra University from 1973-77. Author of two books and numerous articles on lawyers' ethics. Served as the first executive director of the United States Holocaust Memorial Council and as legal advisor to the chair of the Council.

FRED W. FRIENDLY Edward R. Murrow Professor Emeritus of Broadcast Journalism at the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism, and Director of the Media and Society Seminars. Taught at Yale University and Bryn Mawr College. Former advisor on communications to the president of the Ford Foundation and originator and director of Media-Law Seminars. Producer of 600 seminars, 83 for television, including the series "Ethics in America," "The Bill of Rights," "Education in America" and "Who Gives a Damn." President of CBS News from 1964-66. Author of several books, including "The Constitution: That Delicate Balance," a companion publication to the television series. Recipient of numerous honorary degrees.

NICOLAS GAGE Author of "Eleni," a book translated into 14 languages and winner of several awards, including best book of 1984 by the Royal Society of Literature of Great Britain. A movie version of "Eleni" was released in 1985. Recipient of an honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Boston University.

VINCENT GALASSO Principal, Bronx High School of Science. Formerly served as the school's science coordinator, assistant principal and supervisor of the Biology Department; served as a program developer for the High School Division of the New York City Board of Education.

MARTIN GARBUS Human rights and constitutional lawyer. Represented prisoners of conscience and victims of state security in Europe, Africa, Asia, Latin America and the United States, including Russian dissidents Andrei Sakharov and Anatoly Sharansky, Nelson Mandela, poor blacks in Mississippi trying to vote, Václav Havel and Viking Penguin, Salman Rushdie's publisher.

CLAIRE L. GAUDIANI President of Connecticut College. Former Acting Associate Director of the Lauder Institute for Management and International Studies at the University of Pennsylvania. Member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of Higher Education and the Commission on International Education of the American Council on Education. Ph.D. in 17th century French Literature from Indiana University.

ARTHUR GELB President, The New York Times Company Foundation. Former Managing Editor of *The New York Times*, having served previously as chief cultural correspondent and as an editor in various areas of the paper. Author of many articles on cultural subjects and co-author and editor with A.M. Rosenthal of several books, including "One More Victim," a study of anti-Semitism. Also co-authored with his wife, Barbara Gelb, the seminal biography of Eugene O'Neill.

ELI GINZBERG Hepburn Professor Emeritus of Economics and Special Lecturer at the Graduate School of Business, Columbia University, and since its inception in 1978, Director of the Revson Fellows Program at Columbia. Long-term consultant to the Departments of State, Defense, Labor, Health and Human Services and the General Accounting Office. From 1984-86, co-chair, Advisory Committee, Job Creation Education Project, National Committee for Full Employment. Recipient of numerous awards and honors; served as consultant to various corporate enterprises and philanthropic organizations. Member of the Mayoral Commission to consider the future of child health in New York City (1987-88). Author of more than 100 books in the fields of human resources, urban studies and health policy.

RICHARD E. GREEN Executive Director, Crown Heights Youth Collective, a multi-dimensional youth development program which he founded in 1978. While earning a Masters in African Studies at the State University of New York at New Paltz, organized an after-school tutoring program for Poughkeepsie youth; set up a volunteer education and recreation program in the Vanderveer Houses in Brooklyn. Recipient of many awards, including the Outstanding Leadership Award by the National Council of Negro Women, and the Borough President's Racial and Ethnic Unity Award. Author of "Cosmic Chants," a collection of original poetry and photography.

YVONNE S. GREEN School social worker at PS 146 in East Harlem. Works with children, women and families in various school-based programs, including Parent Workshops and Bereavement Groups, Conflict Resolution Meetings, Magic Circle groups, and the "Model for Success" program which she designed. A graduate of Hunter College School of Social Work, she is a consultant for several New York agencies.

ANDREW HACKER Professor of Political Science, Queens College of the City University of New York. Previously taught at Cornell University. Author of many articles published in leading newspapers and magazines, and of eight books, including "Two Nations: Separate, Hostile, Unequal," published in 1992.

RAY HALBRITTER Nation Representative for the Oneida Indian Nation of New York. A graduate of Syracuse University, where he served as president of the Native American Student Organization. Earned a J.D. degree from Harvard Law School in 1990, where he was a member of the American Indian Law Students Association. In the 1970s served as program manager for the Yukon Indian Cultural Education Society.

TIMOTHY HEALY President of the New York Public Library. Former President of Georgetown University, and Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Professor of English at The City University of New York. An ordained priest, he received a doctorate in English literature from Oxford University. Served as a Director and Chairman of the American Council on Education, the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, and has been chairman of the National Advisory Committee on Accreditation and Institutional Eligibility.

FRED M. HECHINGER Senior Advisor at Carnegie Corporation of New York. Devoted much of his career as reporter, columnist, editor, author and foundation executive to issues of education and policies affecting children and society. At *The New York Times*, served as education editor, on the editorial board and as deputy editor of the editorial page; wrote weekly column, "About Education." Former president of The New York Times Company Foundation and The New York Times Neediest Cases Fund. Recipient of honorary doctorates from 15 colleges and universities; numerous awards include the Distinguished Service Medal from Teachers College, Columbia University, and the James Conant Award from the Education Commission of the States (1989). Served on the President's Commission on Foreign Language and International Studies.

ROBERT C. HENDERSON Secretary-General of the National Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of the United States. Earned an Ed.D. from the University of Massachusetts. Author of books and articles on management systems as part of in-service training programs. Former Managing Director of the management consulting firm Tarkenton and Company, and co-founder and executive officer of Air Atlanta.

ANNELISE HØEGH Member of Norwegian Parliament (Stortinget) since 1981; Deputy leader of Oslo Conservative Party since 1988. Member of Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs and currently Chairman of Standing Committee on Consumer Affairs and Government Administration. Chairman of National Council for Children and Youth, 1982-86. Author of numerous articles published in the most influential newspapers in Norway.

ROSELMINA (LEE) INDRISANO Professor of Education and Chairman of the Department of Developmental Studies and Counseling Psychology at Boston University. Founding director and current Advisor to the School of Education's Center for the Assessment and Design of Learning; member of the Management Team for the Boston University-Chelsea Public Schools Partnership. Past president of the International Reading Association and currently serves as secretary to its Reading Hall of Fame.

TONY JUDT Chair of Department of History and Remarque Professor European Studies, New York University. Research interests include French political and intellectual history. Recipient of several fellowships, including a Guggenheim Fellowship. Author of five books including "Past Imperfect: French Intellectuals 1944-1956."

BERNARD KALB Journalist, author, lecturer. Moderator CNN's weekly media review program, "Reliable Sources." Recently a Senior Fellow at the Freedom Forum Media Studies Center, Columbia University. Former world affairs correspondent for CBS News, NBC News and *The New York Times*. Served for two years as Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs and as spokesman for the State Department until his resignation in October 1986 to protest a "disinformation program" by the Reagan administration. Recipient of Overseas Press Club Award for documentary reporting on the war in Vietnam. Co-author of two books including a biography, "Kissinger."

STEFAN KANFER Writer and editor for *Time* magazine for 20 years, with primary responsibility in the culture sections. Author of articles appearing in major periodicals and five books, including "A Journal of the Plague Years," a social history of the blacklist in Hollywood and New York. Recipient of the Missouri-Penny Journalism Prize. Served on the President's Commission on the Holocaust and as writer in residence at the City College of New York. Formerly Professor of Humanities at the State University of New York at Purchase.

FRANCINE KLAGSBRUN Writer and lecturer. Author of articles published in national magazines and Jewish journals, and 16 books including "Mixed Feelings: Love, Hate, Rivalry, and Reconciliation Among Brothers and Sisters." Lectures widely on social, religious, and family issues, including feminism, women in Jewish tradition, ethics in everyday life, sibling attachments and marriage and family matters. Among honorary positions are membership on the Board of Trustees of The Jewish Museum, the Commission on Equality for Women, The American Jewish Congress, and the Executive Board, the Jewish Book Council.

SAMUEL C. KLAGSBRUN Executive Medical Director, Four Winds Hospitals in Katonah and Saratoga Springs, New York. Author and editor of numerous publications and papers.

VITALY A. KOROTICH Visiting Professor of Communication and Journalism at Boston University. Former Editor-in-Chief of *Ogonyok*. Member of the Editorial Council of *Ogonyok* magazine. Elected to the Soviet Congress of People's Deputies (1989), and in this capacity involved in writing the Soviet Union's new press laws. Prior to 1986, involved in television programming in Kiev; author of five filmscripts. Editor of the Ukrainian literary journal, Vsesnit; Secretary of the USSR Writers' Union. Studied medicine at the Kiev Medical Institute; worked as a cardiologist. Author of 42 books. Honored by World Press Review in 1988 as editor of the year.

JOSHUA LEDERBERG University Professor at the Rockefeller University. Served as president at the Rockefeller University from 1978-1990. Awarded the Nobel Prize in Medicine in 1958, for his work in molecular genetics. Served on many advisory commissions, including the National Advisory Mental Health Council.

MARGUERITE LEDERBERG Attending psychiatrist at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center (MSKCC) and clinical associate professor of psychiatry at Cornell University Medical Center. Born in Paris, but educated in the U.S., her clinical specialties are psychological aspects of cancer and how they impact on patients, family and staff. Serves on the MSKCC Ethics Committee and writes on the interface of psychiatry, law and ethics.

ROBERT JAY LIFTON Distinguished Professor of Psychiatry and Psychology, The City University of New York, at John Jay College of Criminal Justice and The Graduate School and University Center, and the Mount Sinai Medical Center. Director of The Center on Violence and Human Survival at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. Previously taught at Yale University for more than two decades. A leader in the new field of psychohistory, the relationship between individual psychology and historical change. Award-winning author; recipient of numerous honorary degrees and awards. Active member of the Board of Physicians for Social Responsibility; founding member of the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War.

LI LU Deputy Leader of the Tienanmen Command Post, political activist and student at Columbia University, New York. Chief advisor to the Student Committee responsible for the health and safety of the 3,600 student hunger strikers in Tienanmen Square; Chairperson at meetings of the Student Congress; official spokesperson for the Democratic Reform Movement. Former head of the student union at Nanjing University.

H. CARL McCALL President of the New York City Board of Education. As New York State Senator for three terms, served on the Education Committee of the Senate; served for several years as Chairman of the Public Education Association of New York. Former Ambassador to the United Nations and former Commissioner of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. Since 1985, has served as a Vice President of Citicorp/Citibank.

MICHEL McQUEEN Journalist. Political reporter for *The Washington Post*, (1980-1987); served as White House correspondent and political writer for *The Wall Street Journal* (1988-92). Research assistant and editor for "Signals from the Hill: Congressional Oversight and the Challenge of Social Regulation" by Christopher Forman, Jr. Recently named by ABC News as correspondent for its news magazine broadcast scheduled to premiere in early 1993. Recipient of numerous journalism awards; honored in 1992 by the National Coalition of 100 Black Women with the Candace Award for Communications.

LESLIE MOORE Principal of The Educational Complex at J.H.S. 99. As a teacher, director and principal in East Harlem for the past 25 years, created academic programs and established long-term relationships with community groups, cultural institutions and the private sector. Member of various community boards and advisor to several cultural institutions.

LANCE MORROW Senior writer and essayist for *Time* magazine. Recipient of the National Magazine Award (for Essays and Criticism) in 1981. Author of "The Chief, A Memoir of Fathers and Sons," "Fishing in the Tiber," "America," and "Safari."

PETER B. NEUBAUER Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, New York University, and John B. Turner Lecturer and Chairman Emeritus, Columbia University, Center for Psychoanalytic Training and Research. Former Director of the Child Development Center, Jewish Board of Family and Children's Services. Author of numerous books and professional papers; editor, *Psychoanalytic Study of the Child*. Past President and Founding Member of the Association for Child Psychoanalysis; Founding Member of the American Academy of Child Psychiatry.

CYNTHIA OZICK Author of novels, poems, essays, articles, reviews and translations. Among many works are "The Pagan Rabbi and Other Stories," "Metaphor and Memory: Essays" and a novel, "The Shawl." Fiction and essays published in various periodicals and anthologies. Recipient of numerous honorary degrees, awards and citations including Lucy Martin Donnelly Award, Bryn Mawr College, 1991-92.

W. ANN REYNOLDS Chancellor of The City University of New York. Previously served for eight years as chancellor of the 20-campus California State University system; held senior level administrative posts in higher education at Ohio State University and the University of Illinois Medical Center. Award-winning scholar in developmental biology specializing in fetal development, placental transfer and nutrition; author or co-author of more than 100 scholarly works.

A.M. ROSENTHAL Columnist; former Metropolitan Editor and Executive Editor of *The New York Times*. Reporter at the United Nations, 1945-54. Correspondent in India, Pakistan, Nepal, Afghanistan and Ceylon. Assigned to Poland in 1958 and expelled after a year and a half for "probing into the internal affairs" of the country and of the Communist Party; won the Pulitzer Prize in 1960 for his reporting from Poland. Has written from Africa, where he covered the Congo war, as well as Switzerland and Japan. Author of two books and some 100 magazine articles, and recipient of several Overseas Press Club awards and numerous other prizes.

WILLIAM M. ROSS Director, Skills Enhancement Center at Bronx Community College of the City University of New York in Continuing Education. Formerly Executive Director of Recruitment and Training Program, Inc., a non-profit program serving minorities and women. Co-chair of the National Urban Coalition's Employment and Policy Task Force; served on the boards of many community organizations.

DIANE RUBLE Professor of Psychology at New York University. Director of the Developmental Concentration, and Co-Director of the Center for Developmental Research and Social Policy, a new center being developed at New York University. Served on the Behavioral Science Review Panel at NIMH, and recently served as co-chair for a special NIMH workshop on social psychology and mental health. Co-author of the book resulting from this workshop, "Social Psychology of Mental Health." Author of numerous articles on child development.

GEORGE D. SCHWAB Professor of History, City University of New York. Author of numerous books and articles; editor, *American Foreign Policy Newsletter.* Member, Columbia University Seminar on Legal and Political Thought; Director, Conference on History and Politics, City University of New York. Board member, National Committee on American Foreign Policy.

EDWARD SEIDMAN Professor of Psychology at New York University. Former Vice President and Dean of Research, Demonstration and Policy, Bank Street College of Education; former President, Division of Community Psychology, American Psychology Association (APA). Recipient of several awards, including the Distinguished Scientific Contribution Award from The Society for Community Research and Action, a division of the APA, in 1990. Author of several books and numerous articles about issues in community psychology.

ALLAN SHEDLIN, JR. Executive Director and Founding Director of the National Elementary School Center, a national advocacy, policy and resource center in New York City. Credited with beginning "the elementary importance movement." Former principal of the Ethical Culture School in New York; taught at Bank Street College of Education. Served as consultant to U.S. Department of Education and many State Departments of Education throughout the country.

JOHN R. SILBER President of Boston University. Author of articles appearing in *The Atlantic*, *Harper's*, *New Republic*, *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal* and other publications. Has written widely on philosophy, education, and social and foreign policy. Author of "Straight Shooting," published in 1989. Former Professor of Philosophy and Chairman of the Philosophy Department at the University of Texas at Austin, where he became Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Leader in the integration of the University of Texas and instrumental in founding Operation Headstart. Appointed by President Ronald Reagan to the national bi-partisan commission on Central America in 1983; decorated by the governments of France, Germany and Israel.

PETER STEINFELS Senior Religion Correspondent for *The New York Times*. Author of "The Neoconservatives" and numerous articles on cultural and political development.

ROSE W. WASHINGTON Commissioner of the New York City Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) since 1990. Advocate of juvenile crime prevention programs for children at risk for delinquent behavior; initiated DJJ new community-based prevention initiatives, including The Court Appearance Program, the Detention Alternative Program and the Reading Achievement Program. Former Assistant Commissioner for Secure Detention at DJJ and Executive Director of the Spofford Juvenile Center, New York City's only secure juvenile detention facility. Elected to the YWCA's Academy of Women Achievers in 1984.

ELIZABETH (LALLY) G. WEYMOUTH Journalist. Currently a columnist for *The Washington Post* writing on foreign affairs. Former contributing editor for *The Washington Post*, *The Los Angles Times*, *Parade Magazine* and *New York* magazine. Author of "America in 1876, The Way We Were." Editor of "Thomas Jefferson: The Man, His World, His Influence."

ELIE WIESEL Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities, Boston University. Author of more than 30 books, including "A Beggar in Jerusalem," "The Testament," and "The Fifth Son." In 1987 established The Elie Wiesel Foundation for Humanity. Awarded the U.S. Congressional Medal of Achievement and the Medal of Liberty. Holds the rank of Grand Officier in the French Legion of Honor. Recipient of the Prix Medicis, the International Literary Prize for Peace of the Royal Academy of Belgium and the Grand Prize for Literature of the City of Paris. Awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986.

GREGORY ALAN-WILLIAMS Actor. Co-starred as police sergeant Garner Ellerbee on the television series "Baywatch," and in numerous other TV productions and films. Member of one of the first African-American professional theatre companies in St. Paul, Minnesota; and is also a script writer and director. Honored by the Los Angeles City Council for risking his life to save a man who had encountered an angry mob during the April 1992 civil unrest in Los Angeles.

JAIME WURZEL Assistant Professor of Intercultural Studies, Boston University, School of Education, Department of Developmental Studies. Author of "Toward Multiculturalism, Readings in Multicultural Education" and several articles on cultural variations in learning and teaching, and schooling and cultural identity. Research interests include Holocaust education and value differences within schools.
